The Hon. Professor Peter R A Gray AM - Adjunct Professor

Peter Gray has been a barrister and a judge of the Federal Court of Australia. For part of his 29-year term as a judge, he was also Aboriginal Land Commissioner, hearing land rights claims in the Northern Territory. His experiences in that role stimulated an interest in communication issues in the legal system, particularly cross-cultural communication. This interest led him to discover forensic linguistics, a field in which he has been active for almost 15 years. Currently, he focuses much of his time on coaching people in public speaking and helping lawyers to understand and solve problems of language in the justice system.

Professor John Gibbons - Adjunct Professor

"The law IS language." says Professor John Gibbons. An experienced academic with extensive publications, Professor Gibbons has worked with the New South Wales Police on their language procedures, consulted concerning federal legal interpreter legislation by the Attorney General's Department, was adviser to the Law Foundation of New South Wales on language and law issues, and has acted as a linguistic expert in more than 40 legal cases. He has previously been President of the International Association of Forensic Linguists, and Convenor of the UN recognised Scientific Committee on Forensic Linguistics.
